

Community mobility hubs

- Accreditation for schemes without the resources of authorities or developers
- Maybole, South Ayrshire:
 - Rural bus and train service
 - Active travel connections
 - Community shared transport
 - Thriving community centre
- Lack of signage and wayfinding
- Applying for funding e.g. tourist ebikes scheme, EV charging





Pop-up mobility hubs

- Freestanding units:
 - Bike repair stand
 - Space for walkers and wheelers
 - Planting
 - Signpost to sustainable transport (inc. bike sharing/bike libraries)
- Range of locations rural and urban
- Forth Valley and Highlands regions
- Evidence base behaviour change
